Asian Americans Face A Wave of Discrimination During the Pandemic

Normalized racism has always been an issue for the Asian American community, but since the start of the pandemic, stories like these have become a natural occurrence. Violence, racism, and discrimination have become more frequent and hate crimes towards Asian Americans have skyrocketed. In September of 2020, an NYPD study showed that there was a 1,900% increase in Asian American hate crimes, and 20 of them occurred in the first half of 2020. Not only that, but according to a U.N. report, 1,800 racist attacks against Asian Americans occurred in 8 weeks from March to May in 2020. However, what many do not realize is that this is nothing new, and that's the problem.

Some history:

After the Opium Wars (1839-1860), China was in debt, causing an influx of Chinese Immigrants to the United States. In 1852, 20,000 Chinese immigrants came to San Francisco resulting in an altercation with the White gold miners. As a result, the Foreign Miners Act was enacted, in which Chinese miners were forced to pay a tax of \$3 a month (about \$100 in 2021). Efforts to silence Chinese Immigrants continued with the 1854 ruling of People V.S. Hall which decided Chinese Americans wouldn't be able to testify in court, enabling the growing violence. The Chinese Exclusion act was furthered with the Geary Act of 1892, which extended the Chinese Exclusion act for about 10 years and required Chinese Immigrants to carry "certificates of residence". If they didn't have these documents, they were condemned to deportation and could only be bought out if they had a "credible white witness". Chinese Americans continued to be discriminated against by the government with acts like the Immigration Act of 1924 placing them, and other ethnic groups, as "undesirable" in the United States. It wasn't until 1943 when the Chinese Exclusion Act was repealed and Chinese Immigrants and their families became eligible for citizenship.

Discrimination towards Asian Americans isn't just limited to the Chinese Exclusion Act. During WW2 the government displaced around 110,000 Japanese Americans, mostly from the Pacific Coast, and forced them into concentration camps. It wasn't until March of 1946, the last Concentration Camp closed.

The reason we bring up these various discrimination acts and occurrences is to emphasize the fact that discrimination against Asian Americans is not atypical in the U.S. (or anywhere else in the world for that matter). This has been a part of America's story since the very beginning, and the pandemic has only escalated this behavior. And although these attacks are not uncommon, they are very rarely showcased or talked about in news outlets and the media.

A few of the MANY cases that have transpired since March 2020:

- A 91-year-old man was shoved in Oakland's Chinatown.
- The attacks have not stopped in 2021; an 84-year-old Thai man was killed in an unprovoked attack in San Francisco.
- A 64-year-old Vietnamese American woman was attacked in San Jose and robbed of \$1,000.
- On January 28, a young man by the name of Vicha Ratanpakdee was shoved to the ground in San Francisco while taking his morning walk.
- Stop AAPI Hate, a coalition consisting of several Asian American advocacy groups, stated in an August 2020 report that over 2,500 hate crimes against Asian Americans have occurred across the country since the group was founded in March of 2020 (just within six months).

In the Aeroplane Over the Sea - by Neutral Milk Hotel genre: alternative/indie

In the Aeroplane Over the Sea is a unique album in a lot of ways. It's an album with strange lyricism that keeps you wondering what the true meaning of it is, feeling familiar and even nostalgic at times.

The first two songs, King of Carrot Flowers Pt. 1 and King of Carrot Flowers Pts. 2 & 3 thrust you into a lively, vibrant setting. The guitar provides a gentle introduction and as the lyrics go on they paint a raw picture of the early years of the singer's life with an unnamed person. In my mind it describes an intimate relationship with this person in which they escape from the reality of their lives.

The second track is a bit more confusing. It starts by praising Jesus, a somewhat unexpected shift in tone accompanied by crashing instrumentals and a fast tempo. The track quickly begins to sound more like a rock song as the lyrics dissolve into a more abstract image, with recurring themes of learning to speak, and learning to swim. It gives you the image of someone who is perhaps overcoming the struggles of the first track, and besides that the message is up to your interpretation.

The third track, my personal introduction to the album, is the titular In the Aeroplane Over the Sea. To me this hits the hardest, as it paints a beautiful picture of life and happiness. The singer highlights the brevity of life, how quickly moments fade away. Life will eventually end, but for now we can hold on to the sweet, strange moments and live for now. This is, without a doubt, my favorite song from the album, and if you listen to any one song from In The Aeroplane Over the Sea I hope you choose this one. After this track you begin to feel a bit more grounded in the world Neutral Milk Hotel is portraying, one that can be sad but is always full of life and optimism and hope for the future. The line, "Can't believe how strange it is to be anything at all," really exemplifies these notions.

The fourth track, Two Headed Boy, begins another two song saga which we will revisit at the end of the review. The strong vocals are refreshing, accompanied mainly by guitar. It's another track without a clear meaning, but the themes of death and regret permeate. It leads into The Fool, a short, waltz-like break from the album.

This is followed by Holland, 1945, an upbeat tune with sad lyrics. It's here that acute listeners start to recognize the many references to Anne Frank, a young German-Dutch diarist who lost her life in the Holocaust, as the singer describes her story and legacy. The first verse is prefaced by "The only girl I've ever loved." This, without a doubt, is a strange choice. Jeff Magnum, Neutral Milk Hotel's lyricist and vocalist, has stated that most of the songs on An Aeroplane Over the Sea are influenced by Frank's diary. With this knowledge the melancholic nature of the album makes a lot more sense, and your perspective on many of the tracks may shift. It's beautiful to me that her life is honored in this way, as it was so tragic and short and it often seems stories like hers are overlooked or simplified when the people involved were very much real and complex individuals.




The next track, Communist Daughter, uses the struggle between fascism and communism in the early 1900's as a metaphor for the societal expectations that are often placed on human sexuality. It's a short, slow, melodic track. Next up is Oh Comely, following similar themes. It explores an adulterous relationship from the perspective of their child, a sad, personal viewpoint that hits hard. Once again the lyrics are strange and leave a lot of room for interpretation. It's also one of the longer tracks, with a slow, intimate vibe. The instrumentals are topped off with trumpets near the end, making for an emotional conclusion.

Ghost, the third to last song, talks about a ghost in the singer's house, and it's another one of the most direct references to Anne Frank's life, describing a girl who now "knows she'll never be afraid," living in a place "Where no-one can escape." It's an upbeat track with depressing lyrics, much like most other songs on the album, and it leads into [untitled], an exciting and upbeat break from all the sadness. It seems like a moment of rejoicement, filled with enthused bagpiping. In Ghost, the singer remarks that "all goes on and on," aligning with the theme of death as a celebration of life rather than the end of all things. This track seems to reflect this realization, joining the rest of the album in an exploration of life's highs and lows even in the face of extreme sadness and tragedy.

Finally we make our way to Two Headed Boy Pt. 2, which caps off the album with a profoundly sad tone, feeling like the end of a long journey. It has strong themes of loss and separation. The lyrics express that crumbling after loss, holding on to what once was, is counterintuitive and life will still go on. The line "When we break we'll wait for our miracle," followed by "God is a place you will wait for the rest of your life," implies that waiting on some miracle to pick you back up is pointless. The world is as abundant in miracles and joy as it is in tragedy, and it is all up to you where you'll end up. In the end, all we have are our experiences and our own minds to rely on, and the world will go on no matter what choices we make. After a tear jerking couple of minutes we hear Magnum set his guitar down as he leaves us to ponder the true message of his album.
